


TOWN OF EXETER



Town Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Exeter, in the County of Rockingham, in said state qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Exeter, on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, by official ballot, and to take other action required to be inserted on said official ballot; the polls to open at eight o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than eight o'clock in the evening, and thereafter to reconvene at the Exeter High School gymnasium on Monday, March 14, 1983 at seven o'clock in the afternoon, for the purpose of acting on all other matters to come before the meeting.

ARTICLE 1

To choose by ballot and plurality vote two (2) Selectmen for the term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 2

To choose by ballot and plurality vote three (3) members of the Library Committee for the term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 3

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Trustee of Trust Funds for the term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 4

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Trustee of the Robinson Fund for the term of seven (7) years.

ARTICLE 5

To choose by ballot and plurality vote one (1) Trustee of the Swasey Parkway for the term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE 6 — Zoning Amendment #1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

Amend Article 6.70 through Article 6.74 for the purpose of: providing a clearer delegation of authority to the Historic District Commission; reenacting the Downtown Historic District to cure an alleged procedural deficiency in its original enactment in March of 1979, without increasing the boundaries of said District as then enacted; and recodifying and harmonizing the existing provisions of the Zoning Ordinance in respect to the two existing Historic Districts; delete Articles 6.70, 6.71, 6.72, 6.72-1, 6.73 and 6.74 in their entirety and substitute therefor the following so that it reads:

6.70 HISTORIC DISTRICTS

6.71 GENERAL-ADMINISTRATIVE

The town, by the authority granted under N.H.R.S.A. Chap. 31:89-a through 1, established an Historic District Commission on June 8, 1970.

6.71.1 MEMBERSHIP

The Commission will consist of seven members appointed by the Selectmen. One of the seven members will be a Selectman. One of the seven members will be a member of the Planning Board. In determining the qualifications of a proposed member, the Selectmen will take into consideration his or her demonstrated interest and ability to understand, appreciate and promote the purpose of this ordinance. Members will be appointed for 3-year terms. Terms will be staggered.

6.71-2 PURPOSE AND INTENT

The purposes of the Historic District Commission of Exeter are: (1) to safeguard the heritage of the Town as it is represented in structures of historical and architectural value located, or which may be located, in an historic district; (2) to preserve and reflect elements of the community's architectural, cultural, social, economic and political history; (3) to conserve property values; (4) to foster civic pride, and (5) to promote use of an historic district for the education, pleasure and welfare of the citizens of Exeter. The intent of the Downtown Historic District is to preserve the scale and unique historic character of Exeter's downtown, while permitting new construction of a size, scale, and design that will be in harmony with the old. It is intended that the Water Street commercial area retain and enhance its commercial character, and that residential portions of the district retain their residential qualities.

6.71-3 SCOPE

The Historic District Commission, hereinafter called the Commission, will accept applications for Certificates of Approval to alter, improve, restore, construct or move structures, into or within an historic district. It shall review, hold public hearings, approve or disapprove applications and issue Certificates of Approval, appending thereto such conditions on performance of the work as it may deem appropriate or necessary.

Certificates of Approval shall be required for any work done on the exterior of buildings or structures located, or to be located in an historic district and shall be required for any additional buildings on the land within its boundaries. The word 'work' shall mean and may not be limited to: alteration, restoration, moving, demolition of a part or parts of any building or structure, and any activity within a district effecting or affecting the purposes of the Commission. The Commission shall issue

application forms for Certificate of Approval and shall issue Certificates of Approval.

6.71-4 AUTHORITY TO ADOPT REGULATIONS

The Historic District Commission, after notice and public hearing, may adopt such regulations regarding its procedures in hearing and processing applications and statements of policy as required by R.S.A. 31:89-e as it shall deem fit and shall compile such regulations in printed form to be available to applicants and citizens of the Town.

6.71-5 APPEAL

Any person or persons jointly or severally aggrieved by a decision of the Commission shall have the right to appeal concerning such a decision to the Board of Adjustment.

6.71-6 ADMINISTRATION, ENFORCEMENT AND LIMITATION

1. These sections shall be administered by the Commission, the Building Inspector, The Town Planning Director and such other lawfully empowered officers of the Town.
2. In addition to all others lawfully entitled to enforce these sections, the Historic District Commission is empowered to enforce them in accordance with R.S.A. 31:89-1.
3. Nothing in these sections shall be construed to prevent ordinary maintenance or repair of any structure or place within any historic district, nor to prevent the construction, alteration, repair, moving, or demolition of any structure under a permit issued by the Building Inspector or other duly delegated authority prior to the establishment of any such district.

6.72 DISTRICTS

6.72-1 FRONT STREET DISTRICT

On June 10, 1971, the Town voted to establish the Front Street Historic District which is bounded as follows:

At a point beginning at the centerline of Spring Street at the junction of Front Street, thence running northerly along said Spring Street to a point at the centerline of Water Street at the junction of Spring and Water Streets, thence turning and running in a southeasterly direction along said Water Street to a point at the junction of Water and Front Streets, thence turning and running southerly to a point at the junction at Lincoln and Front Streets. This district shall include

all properties on both sides of Front Street to the property line or 200 feet from the curb line, whichever comes first. Also included in this district is Gale Park and the Richard Kent House. The historic district shall include all lands within the bounds as set forth by these boundaries.

6.72-2 DOWNTOWN HISTORIC DISTRICT

On March 17, 1979, the Town voted to establish the Downtown Historic District which is bounded as follows:

An area beginning at the centerline of Water Street where it intersects with Main Street, then runs easterly along the centerline of Water Street and High Street to the intersection with Portsmouth Avenue, and includes all portions of all properties with frontage on these portions of Water Street and High Street not already included in the so-called "Front Street" Historic District established on June 10, 1971, to a depth of 200 feet from the curb line or the rear property line, whichever comes first; and the district includes all land between Water Street and the banks of the Exeter and Squamscott Rivers, and the Exeter and Squamscott Rivers from a line connecting Jady Hill Avenue to a point on the Swasey Parkway 200 feet from its intersection with Water Street, to a line 200 feet southeasterly of the High Street bridge, including Kimball's Island; the district includes an area beginning at the intersection of Pleasant Street with High Street and running northerly along Pleasant Street and Chestnut Street to its intersection with Chestnut Hill Avenue, then proceeding southwesterly along Chestnut Hill Avenue to its intersection with Water Street and including all properties with frontage on the above portions of Pleasant Street and Chestnut Street to a depth of 200 feet from the curb line or the rear property line, whichever comes first, and all property that fronts on Chestnut Hill Avenue between Chestnut Street and the easterly bank of the river to a depth of 50 feet and all properties lying between said portion of Pleasant and Chestnut Streets and the Exeter/Squamscott Rivers. The District is intended to specifically include the properties from 1-35 High Street, and 2-30 High Street, and the properties fronting on Gilman Lane within 200 feet of High Street, the properties at No. 1 and Nos. 2-24 Franklin Street, and the properties at 11-13 Chestnut Street. The District is also described on an excerpt from the Exeter Tax

Map entitled "Downtown Historic District", dated January 30, 1978.

6.73 STANDARDS AND EXTENT

6.73-1

Jurisdiction of these sections extends to all structures not owned by the Town of Exeter, the State of New Hampshire or the United States government and located in whole or in part within the boundaries of the District. Other subjects covered by the ordinance include, but are not limited to: signs, landscape features, fences, street furniture, and other factors affecting the character of the streetscape. Changes or additions to structures and appurtenances, including those described in this paragraph, in the historic districts shall be permitted by written approval of the Historic District Commission after review of the following criteria:

1. **New Buildings and Structures.** New Construction shall be evaluated on the basis of its compatibility with existing structures and overall effect on the historic character of the district.
2. **Existing Buildings.** The exterior of existing buildings (front, sides and rear visible within the historic district) may be maintained as is. If they are to be changed it shall be to maintain or reestablish their basic appearance as of the time of construction, or to another period when the facade attained architectural significance. No significant architectural details may be removed or changed without a certificate of approval from the Historic District Commission. Synthetic siding materials shall not be used to cover or replace existing architectural features. Contemporary design treatment may be deemed appropriate where previous modifications have removed significant architectural features, and on the rear of structures along the Squamscott River.
Painting and other routine maintenance of existing structures not involving any other exterior changes are not within the jurisdiction of the Historic District Commission providing surface preparation and repairs do not alter, damage or deface existing architectural elements. Parties interested in promoting the spirit and intent of the District are encouraged to come before the Commission for informal guidance in the selection of historically appropriate colors or details.

3. **Specific Design Considerations.** All applications shall be judged based on the following criteria:

- a. Proportions of facades (scale, massing of elements)
 - b. Proportions of openings within the facade
 - c. Rhythm of solids to voids within the facade
 - d. Rhythm of spacing of buildings on streets or along roads or waterways
 - e. Percent of lot coverage and setback relative to adjacent structures
 - f. Size and rhythm of projections
 - g. Relationship of materials to existing and adjacent structures
 - h. Relationship of texture
 - i. Relationship of color of prefinished or natural materials
 - j. Relationship of architectural details
 - k. Relationship of roof configurations and slopes
 - l. Relationship of landscaping
 - m. Such other criteria as the Commission may promulgate by regulation proximal to the authority granted in paragraph 6.71-3 above.
4. **Scale.** Story heights of new construction or additions to existing buildings shall not be 10% over, or under, the average height of adjacent (within 250' radius of the center of the parcel) buildings.
 5. **Marina Facilities.** Those marina facilities constructed on or over the water shall be of predominately wooden construction; however, modern engineering methods and treated materials may be used.
 6. **Demolition, Removal or Relocation.** No structure or portion of any structure shall be demolished, removed, or relocated within the district without the approval of the Commission.
 7. **Signs.** Signs within the historic district shall comply with the provisions of section 6.83 of this ordinance, its successors or amendment ordinance.

6.73-2 GENERAL POLICY

The Historic District Commission in making decisions shall apply the above paragraphs and consider the Downtown Master Plan, and the Secretary of the Interior's Guidelines for Rehabilitation of Historic Structures.

6.74 ADDITIONAL HISTORIC DISTRICTS

This section shall be applicable to such additional historic districts as may be established by vote of the Town.

ARTICLE 7 — Zoning Amendment #2

On petition of twenty-five or more voters, are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2, as proposed by petition of the voters of this town as follows?:

Amend the Town of Exeter Zoning Map and Zoning Ordinance, adopted March 6, 1973, to establish a new district named the Health Care Facilities District with the following district boundaries, controls and regulations:

Zoning Map Amendment

Establish the HC — Health Care Facilities District with the following district boundaries:

Beginning on the Easterly side of Prospect Avenue at its intersection with Highland Street, thence running Southerly by Prospect Avenue to land of Katherine O'Connor; thence running Easterly and Southerly by land of Katherine O'Connor and land now or formerly of Alexander Bell to the Northerly side of Auburn Street; thence running Easterly by Auburn Street to its intersection with Buzzell Avenue; thence running Northerly by Buzzell Avenue to the point of its termination at land of Exeter Hospital; thence running Easterly crossing Buzzell Avenue to the Northwesterly corner of land of Exeter Clinic, Inc.; thence running Easterly, Northerly, Easterly again, and Southerly by land of Exeter Clinic, Inc. to land of Carolyn Dixon; thence running Easterly and Southerly by land of Carolyn Dixon to land of Kearns and Colliander; thence running Easterly by land of Kearns and Colliander and land of Robert D. Bosak to other land of Exeter Hospital; thence running Easterly and Southerly by land of Exeter Hospital to a point on the Northerly side of High Street; thence running Easterly by High Street to land of Irene A. Barker; thence running Northerly and Easterly by land of Irene A. Barker to land of Robert and Jeanette Kesler; thence running Northerly by land of Robert and Jeannette Kesler and land of Elizabeth F. Smith to land of Margaret Baril; thence running Westerly by land of Margaret Baril to land now or formerly of Estate of Ralph W. Turner; thence running Southerly and Westerly by land of said Turner Estate and land of Town of Exeter to land of the Estate of Florence Walsh; thence running Southerly and Westerly by land of said Walsh Estate crossing a right of way to land of Harold and Emma Foss to Highland Street; thence running Easterly by Highland Street to the point of beginning.

ARTICLE 8 — Zoning Amendment #3

On petition of twenty-five or more voters, are you in favor of the adoption of a zoning map and zoning ordinance amendment to amend Sec. 4.10 and zoning map to change the use zone for the property located at 2 Lincoln Street, Exeter, from R2 to C1.

ARTICLE 9

To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Auditors, or Committees for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 10

To see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the maintenance of the poor, for repairing and building bridges, for repairing and building sidewalks, for building drains and sewers, for oiling streets, for payment of the Town debts, for lighting streets, for defraying expenses of decorating the graves of soldiers, for payment of firemen during the ensuing year, and for other charges arising within the Town.

ARTICLE 11

To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, and pursuant to New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Section 33:7 and Section 33:7-a to incur debt for temporary loans in anticipation of 1983 taxes, and in anticipation of any bond issue which may be voted by the Town, and to issue therefore notes of the Town payable within one (1) year after their date, and to pay or renew the same by issue of new notes payable within one (1) year after the date of the original publication.

ARTICLE 12

To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept, and expend money from the state, federal, or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 31, Section 95-b, requiring that such sums be used only for legal purposes for which a town may appropriate funds; and provided that the Selectmen hold a prior public hearing on the action to be taken; and that town funds not be expended.

ARTICLE 13

To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual salary of the Town Clerk at twenty thousand one hundred eighty-seven and twenty-six hundredths dollars (\$20,187.26), and to raise the appropriate and additional sum of seven hundred seventy-six and forty-three hundredths dollars (\$776.43) above the sum budgeted therefore.

ARTICLE 14

To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual salary of the Tax Collector at fifteen thousand five hundred thirty-one and fifty-eight hundredths dollars (\$15,531.58) and to raise and appropriate an additional sum of five hundred ninety-seven and thirty-seven hundredths dollars (\$597.37) above the sum budgeted therefore.

ARTICLE 15

To see if the Town will vote to fix the annual salary of the Town Treasurer at five thousand six hundred sixteen and twenty hundredths dollars (\$5,616.20), and to raise and appropriate an additional sum of two hundred sixteen dollars (\$216.00) above the sum budgeted therefore.

ARTICLE 16

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fourteen thousand one hundred five dollars (\$14,105.00) for the purpose of contracting for mosquito control services for the period of March 1983 to March 1984.

ARTICLE 17

To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of one hundred three thousand dollars (\$103,000.00) for the exploration of additional water supply, the purchase of water rights, property and easements, the installation of test wells and/or water mains, to convey water, if found, into the town water system, and to include all appurtenances and professional services, and to authorize the withdrawal of this amount for this purpose from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1983 calendar year.

ARTICLE 18

To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for a Highway Department front end loader, and raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) for said Capital Reserve Fund, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1983 calendar year.

ARTICLE 19

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) for a new fire truck to add to the Capital Reserve Fund established in 1982, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1983 calendar year.

ARTICLE 20

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) to add to the Library Capital Reserve Fund established in 1982, and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1983 calendar year.

ARTICLE 21

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventeen thousand dollars (\$17,000.00) to purchase a refuse load packer body and authorize the withdrawal of this sum for this purpose from Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be received by the Town in the 1983 calendar year.

ARTICLE 22

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twelve thousand six hundred seventy-eight dollars (\$12,678.00) as partial reimbursement to the Exeter Area Visiting Nurses Association, Inc. for providing continual home health care services to residents of the Town of Exeter.

ARTICLE 23

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand eight hundred eleven dollars (\$7,811.00) as its contribution to the Rockingham Planning Commission.

ARTICLE 24

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) to defray a portion of the cost of service rendered by the Area Homemaker-Home Health Aide Service, Inc.

ARTICLE 25

To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) as a share in the initial expenses of a project to publish a History of Exeter, 1888-1988, to mark the Town's 350th anniversary in 1988.

ARTICLE 26

On petition of Raymond E. Eldridge, Jr. and others, to see if the Town will vote to accept the existing sewer line servicing all the buildings on the northerly side of Water Street from String Bridge to Swasey Parkway.

ARTICLE 27

On petition of Joanna J. Pellerin and others, to see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Exeter, N.H. and to the health and welfare of the people of Exeter, N.H.

These actions shall include:

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990.

2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

On petition of Paul R. Mahoney and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500.00) for Seacoast Big Brother/Big Sister, a non-profit volunteer organization, to help defray some of the expenses for fiscal year 1983.

ARTICLE 30

On petition of Joseph E. Wheeler and others, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand seventy-one dollars (\$4,071.00) for the Greater Raymond Community Action Center, part of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc., a private, non-profit, anti-poverty agency.

Selectmen

I think that it is appropriate to begin this report by paying the Board's respect to two of our deceased colleagues: Board member Ethel Doe and Budget Committee Chairman Arthur Burgess. We still feel the void created by the loss of these two very dedicated members of our town government.

No doubt, the most important items of this year's business are the search for a new town water source, and the joint town-school venture in sharing the computer facilities.

We can only hope that the search for water is successful. The benefit will be a substantial savings in the cost of treating the drinking water that we now have. The first step in this direction was the cleaning of the Skinner Spring wells. At this time, drilling is underway in the northern part of Exeter.

The town-school computer center has worked out past all expectations. There has been a great deal of

cooperation by both parties, under the able leadership of Mr. Jack Robertson. Not only does the future of this venture hold promise as far as savings in town governmental functions, but projections include savings in the number of personnel and increased functions that may include joint purchasing. The number of items that the computer may handle is almost beyond imagination because we have built a system that may be added to in the future, at a reasonable cost. In anticipation of the workload, workers in the town office are being cross-trained in computer skills to further streamline operations.

Other improvements town department received this year are more sidewalk plows and a new dump truck in the Highway Department — both designed to reduce the amount of private contract work we have had to let out in the past. Also, we were fortunate to have the fire department

ladder truck repaired in good order by the manufacturer: ladder assembly and addition of a new cab.

The Budget Committee organization was changed this year. Now, in addition to the general committee, the committee was slit into small groups to study specific segments of town government. This new arrangement has seemed to have helped the budget process by individual members more aware of the workings of the budget as it pertains to certain departments.

In summary, the Board of Selectmen has strived to give the taxpayers of Exeter the best possible value for this tax dollars, especially by the close adherence to the 2.75 tax cap mandated by a former special town meeting.

Town Manager

The Town portion of taxes continues to stay within the 2.75 guideline and the Town will end the 1982 year with a surplus. The amount of the surplus has not been determined by the auditor as of this writing of this report.

In order to economize, the Town has discontinued eight full-time positions in the last three years.

The Town and School Department have purchased a computer for joint use and it looks as if this will have been a good move even though all

operations have not been completely transferred to the new system.

Mrs. Barrows, Welfare Director, started the Mediation Program to try to do something about some of the juvenile problems. The work of the volunteers is very much appreciated as this is a very worthwhile program.

The Town Meeting approved \$50,000. to look for water wells. The test well drilling has started, but no water has been found as of the writing of this report. It is very important that we find some good

wells, if possible, to try to assure a more economical water supply. It is hoped that Town Meeting will approve more Revenue Sharing funds for searching for an improved water supply.

I thank the Selectmen, Department Heads, Town Employees, and Boards and Commissions for their dedicated work to the Town of Exeter.

Exeter Highway Department

I respectfully submit the Annual Report for the Town of Exeter's Highway Department.

During the year 1982 there were fifteen storms with a total accumulation of approximately 55.5 inches of snow and 7 freezing rain storms.

Summer maintenance consisted of the usual Spring Clean-up, cold patching of potholes, storm drain cleaning, repairs, plus trimming and grooming of roadsides.

The streets that got Bituminous concrete leveling under our paving program were Gilman Lane, Bow Street, Clifford Street, South Street, River Street, Browns Court, Gill Street, Parker Street, Arbor Street, Mill Street, Garfield Court, Spruce Street, and small portions of Front Street, Powder Mill Road, Court Street, and Marston Street.

Some sidewalk work was done under the 50 + 50 Program that we have. Necessary patching was also done.

The TRA "A" Funds were used to reconstruct John West Road which was in terrible shape. It had been scheduled to be done for a number of years, but due to the expense, had to wait for funds to build up.

We didn't do any street oiling this year because of the over-expenditures in our winter maintenance accounts. This is one way of staying within our over all appropriations.

Bell & Flynn, Inc. was the low bidder for the Bituminous concrete leveling work and the Town employees raised the necessary utilities on the streets that we paved.

Water and Sewer

I respectfully submit the Annual Report for the Town of Exeter's Water and Sewer Departments.

During the year we have had five employees attend classes on water treatment and one employee involved in wastewater treatment. They are all certified by the State of New Hampshire to operate the two systems.

We have had a fairly good year since the reorganization. We were able to change a large valve that was leaking, change the chains and sprockets in one of the sludge pits, replaced a large number of old meters, along with working with the contractor who completed the main and service crossovers on Highland Street.

In the Sewer Department three new pumps were installed at the Webster Avenue Station. In addition pressure cleaning, rodding, and bucketing the sewer lines in the critical areas was done.

All twelve water and sewer pumping stations were maintained in the usual manner.

Fire Department

The replacement of the Chief's car, along with the refurbishing and replacement of the fire alarm "lift" truck were two of the major accomplishments of 1982. The entire fire alarm truck project was performed in the fire department maintenance shop with on-duty personnel. All sandblasting and painting was also done in-house.

The ladder truck has been refitted with a new 85', four-section steel ladder with additional safety features. It has also been fitted with a new cab to protect equipment, instruments and personnel.

We have continued our planned 3" hose replacement for Engine 3, our primary sprinkler supply truck. The standardization of the two-way radio system is close to completion in our fleet of ten vehicles. We were also able to add to the standardization of our nozzles and add gasahol and all-purpose foam to our existing foam bank.

In the meantime the Exeter Fire Department has answered over 2300 calls, ranging from service calls (unlocking doors, etc.) to fires, medical emergencies, and rescues.

We have also seen a decrease in false or malfunctions from smoke alarms due to better maintenance programs in the public sector, encouraged by this department.

This year has also enabled us to complete our hydrant flowing and marking which was highlighted by a massive mutual aid drill in the downtown area. A fire flow of 8300 gallons per minute was attained.

Several Fire Prevention programs were presented throughout the community including our Public Schools and Hospital. Members of our department also participated in disaster drills, planning and critiques. We are now in the midst of preplanning and having all of our fire alarm boxes assigned the proper coverage. I feel confident that we can handle most of the everyday fire problems short of a conflagration.

I wish to thank all members and other town agencies for their assistance throughout the year.

Assessor

Ideas of tax reform are being discussed by our legislators for the upcoming session. The concept of "Land Use Reform" is currently being given consideration by our

legislative body. Generally speaking, this would cause a shift in taxes and the burden will fall on the land owners. All land would be taxed an additional amount but the greatest

impact would be on landowners only with about a 26-27% increase in taxes. I feel this would be even greater a year or two down the road. The approval of current use assessment would provide a circuit breaker for many of the landowners since there are no plans for any changes in this law. There will be much thought given to this matter as there are many unanswered questions at this time.

April 15 is the deadline for NEW applicants who wish to apply for any type of exemption on their taxes. In some instances, verification of income and assets may be needed in order to prove eligibility.

Planning Board

The Exeter Planning Board continued review of proposed development, meeting most of the year on a weekly basis. Twenty-three applications were submitted for approval of such plans as professional offices, apartment conversions and

expansion of commercial businesses. Renovation of a restaurant into a drive-in bank on Portsmouth Ave. was approved and Nike's occupation of the former Clemson plant was completed successfully, with expansion of the parking area reviewed and approved by the board. Approval of subdivision plans resulted in 25 new house lots in town.

Besides the customary review of subdivisions and site plans, the board last year endorsed a new Mobile Home Subdivision District to comply with the new state law relating to placement of mobilehomes on individual lots. The Planning Board has been working with the Historic District Commission to reorganize these regulations within the zoning ordinance. Also, a proposal for rezoning by the Exeter Hospital is being reviewed. The Planning Office undertook the preparation of a "Prime Wetlands Report" to better identify and register with the State those wetlands in Exeter which should be afforded greater protection. The board intends to update the town's master plan and will be working on the open space and recreation element within the coming year.

This coming year promises to be one of "transition" when the building industry begins to recover from some very lean economic times. Residential developers now appear to be lining things up hoping for a turnaround in the economy. Community attitudes have changed from the 'no-growth' stance of the 70's to one of encouraging balanced development in the 80's. The Planning Board, by its policies, hopes to promote continued rejuvenation in the downtown area and quality commercial/industrial development.

Membership on the board remains the same as last year and the board

was pleased to regain the services of Bob Stewart, who was ill a part of the year. Currently, there is one Alternate position open and interested citizens should inquire of the Board of Selectmen for appointment.

I have been keeping a close check on grease going into our lagoons, as our engineers know that it is vital for the proper functioning of these lagoons. I hope this coming year I can emphasize to the people of Exeter not to dispose of grease or fat that will eventually go

from sewers to the lagoons.

I have been attending Health meetings in other cities and towns so I could benefit from their experience on health problems.

With the excellent cooperation that I receive from the people of Exeter, I feel that I can handle most of our health problems.

Police Department

During 1982, the Police Department handled a number of complaints and cases involving crimes and violations. The number of serious incidents were reduced during the period and at the same time we saw an increase in the number of persons arrested for these types of crime.

As in the past, we have continued to provide various services to the community such as: issuing permits, registration of bicycles, community programs, and house checks. In 1982, the Communications Center received approximately 45,000 telephone calls resulting in 17,061 incidents requiring police service, 463 calls for fire responses, 416 ambulance calls and additionally 1,459 calls for fire service. The center also dispatched 1,928 emergency calls for those area communities that contract for dispatching service.

We are happy to service you and welcome your calls. Please remember, we can only be as effective as you make us! Make us aware of what is happening if you see an unusual incident, or a crime, call us immediately. A statistical chart of the number and type of incidents in 1982 accompanies this report.

Visiting Nurse Association

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc. is a community health service that provides health care to individuals and families in their home, in the office, or in clinics. The care may be to prevent disease, promote, maintain or restore health, or it may be to minimize the effects of illness or disability.

The Association is a non-profit agency governed by a Board of Directors. This Board is made up of people who are appointed by the selectmen in your town.

Funding for the Association comes from Medicare, Medicaid, patient fees, local taxes, and donations. Town appropriations make the service available to the town.

1982 was a year of accomplishment for the EAVNA in spite of state and federal cuts.

Home Care. Two new services have been added to the Home Care Program; speech and occupational therapy. Persons confined to their homes are now able to receive these therapies at a more effective time rather than having to wait until they

are well enough to leave their homes. The home health aide staff has been increased to meet the demands for assistance with personal care while the nursing staff has responded to a need for support and treatment to persons requiring more skilled care at home than before. This is possible through continuing education to ensure competency to meet these needs. The Agency continues to provide physical therapy to a large number of persons in the service area.

Maternal and Child Health. The enrollment in this program continues to increase as the economy declines, providing home visits and clinic services to families with pre-school children.

Adult Health Service. In addition to high blood pressure and blood glucose screenings, flu vaccine immunizations and tuberculosis testing, the Agency now has Foot Care Clinics.

The Agency, recognizing the necessity for qualified health personnel, provides a clinical setting to students of health care to enhance and expand their knowledge.

12,067 units of service were provided to residents of the service

area between January 1, 1982 and December 31, 1982. (Individual town statistics are sent to the selectmen of each town.)

Early in the new year, services will be available on a 24-hour, 7-day basis.

The Agency works closely with other health and social agencies to ensure the most comprehensive care possible to the residents of the participating towns. The Agency continues to maintain its Medicare and Medicaid certification and is a member of the Community Health Care Association of New Hampshire and the National Association for Home Care.

The Association relies upon many valuable volunteers who work at the clinics and in the office in addition to regular staff.

Recreation and Parks

In 1982, the Recreation & Parks Department continued to see growth in programs and participants as the leisure hours of both the students and adults has been on the increase for the last five years. Most of our youth activities saw increases in registration numbers, with the others at a level of the previous year. More use of our parks by all age groups throughout the year from baseball, soccer, picnics, tennis, swimming, family reunions and softball, kept us busy with the care of the facilities, supervision and scheduling.

We were able to continue some of the projects left from the previous year, and had a hand with the exercise trail from Eric Klemarczyk and his Boy Scout troop who are working to finish the course for use in 1983. Eric is working toward his Eagle Scout Badge, a nice honor for a fine young man. The trail was started about four years ago, but never completed for lack of help, so we are pleased that Eric took this on as a project. The trail is behind the tennis courts through the woods and will have 21 stations.

With the fine cooperation we continue to receive from the Phillips Exeter Academy and the Exeter School Department, we were able to offer many activities throughout the year. A family swim on Friday evenings proved to be very popular last fall and throughout the winter months of 1983.

The Exeter TOPS, the Exeter Minstrels, Exeter Odd Fellows and Rebekah's, the Bridge Club, as well as other merchants provided us with extra money for many activities throughout the year. Pepsi Cola and the Rohr's Family Restaurant

provided money for the summer movie program. Don's Pharmacy and the Exeter Knights of Columbus helped with the 2nd Annual Ted Seabrooke Youth Basketball Tournament. We must also thank the Jim Houston Fund for providing youth in need of financial help with equipment and registration fees for many of our year round programs. No child is ever turned away from an activity because of financial reasons. We thank all the groups who helped us over the last twelve months and some for many years.

The outdoor pool saw more use this year as the month of July was one of the hottest in history. We had more than 11,000 people use the pool in 1982, from swim lessons, swim team, and open swims. The tennis courts usage was down some but, with a few ideas for 1983 we hope to bring back some of the players through leagues, tournaments, and lessons.

I will not single out any of our volunteers as there are many but, will just say thanks to you all for the many hours you give to our youth and adults throughout the year. We could never pay for the man/women hours provided by you.

Once again our revenue topped the one hundred thousand figure as we do our best to provide services without increasing the tax rate any more than we need to.

One trend that we did see in 1982 was that we had fewer people using the indoor skating rinks at Phillips Exeter Academy as part of our public skating program, but, did see an increase in the registrants for the figure skating program.

One think we try to accomplish in our department is to offer programs for all age groups, men, women, boys and girls and senior citizens, and not just sports, but in the arts as well.

It is our goal to provide good healthy programs for all interests in our community. I must say our trips to Boston and other locations around the country have been well received from all ages. Our senior citizens enjoy the trips to Boston and points here in New Hampshire. We urge your continued support for these activities as they are a large part of the Recreation movement nationally and will continue to be in the '80s.

One special event that we sponsored the New Hampshire Senior Citizens Talent Show had a fine turnout of participants and the co-sponsors gave us some nice prizes. We plan to run it again in 1983 during the month of October.

A special thanks to the Exeter Highway Department and Bob Strout for his help throughout the year.

I have listed some of the facilities that the Recreation & Parks Department maintains as a continuing effort to keep the community informed of the department's business responsibilities.

Thank you for your support. Why not join the "Life Be In It" program, and get involved in your community as a volunteer, coach, or helper.

Public Library

Nineteen eighty-two was busy at the library. It was sad, and the children's program was interrupted, because Carolyn Jenks left in August. We had barely replaced her in October when Catherine Geanoulis, the assistant Children's librarian, left to go to Vermont. We wish Jane Cullinane and Barbara Young well in their new positions as Children's Librarian and Children's assistant. Barbara like it so well that she is already taking courses for her degree in Library Science.

The Building Committee, re-grouping, started a gratifyingly successful fund drive, soliciting donations from everybody who holds a library card. Thanks to all the Friends of the Library and the Lionesses, who helped address the literally thousands of letters. And great thanks to all the people who sent in money — as well as a vote of confidence. This fund drive also meant we double-checked the registration list, and we have a solidly satisfying number of users: around five times the national average.

I would like to thank Marjorie Rowell, who faithfully lugs heavy boxes of books and films to the nursing homes, and Martha Walsh who has been delivering to shut-ins — and didn't cut down her route even after she took a full time job. The Friends of the Library, once again, sold calendars and raised enough for four free family passes to the Boston Museums of Science, Fine Arts, Children's and Aquarium — anybody with a library card can sign these passes out for a day. Last year about a thousand families took advantage of this program, and more should.

We're getting busier, in-house use as well as just circulation, which is

good. Word is getting around that you can call the library with questions, and the budget-battered New Hampshire State Library is still hooked into computerized information networks such as Database and Medlars, so users have access to all sorts of information. They have also gotten a truck service for interlibrary loan around the state, which is quicker than the mail. All our films come from the State Cooperative. These days, no library can go it alone.

As we get busier, we get more and more crowded, and the inefficiencies of the current building are more and more obvious. We desperately need more space.

Housing Authority

The Exeter Housing Authority opened 15 new apartments for families in March, 1982 at Linden Fields. A community building with laundry, maintenance and meeting space complements this 8+ acre project which was federally funded at a cost of \$1.1 million. A waiting list of applicants for both Linden Fields and the 85 unit Squamscott View Apartments elderly housing has resulted in 100% occupancy.

Robert Curran and Margaret Duhamel were elected Chairman and Vice Chairman in April, 1982. Charles Hayes, after six years of service and five years as Chairman during the EHA's growth period, resigned in October. Selectmen appointed Edward Gustafson as a Commissioner.

The EHA made \$279,915 in assistance payments via the Section 8 Existing Housing Program in 1982. The EHA was awarded funding for

six additional two-bedroom non-elderly units and can now provide rent assistance for as many as 151 households (132 elderly, 19 non-elderly) in privately owned dwellings. The participation of 64 Owners of rental property in increasing the availability of an affordable, decent dwelling for those often priced out of the housing market is an example of how government and private interests can cooperate in providing social benefits.

Rehabilitation of 11-13 Portsmouth Avenue into four apartments and the construction of three apartments on Auburn Street should commence in the spring of 1983 providing two bedroom and three bedroom apartments for lower income families.

Historic District Commission

The Historic District Commission is responsible for reviewing requests for changes within the Front Street and Water Street historical districts for compliance to the district ordinances. The Commission presently consists of six members appointed by the selectmen. One selectman also acts as an additional member of the board.

During 1982 the Commission has reviewed and evaluated applications

for changes in existing facades, changes in site features, new construction, changes to existing signage and new signs to be erected with the historic districts. The Commission has also provided advice and guidance to individuals and businesses seeking information regarding general maintenance and preservation measures appropriate to their specific structures.

The Commission has worked over the past year to refine and clarify the historic district ordinances in order to provide better definition of the areas controlled by the ordinance and guidelines on which to evaluate additions or changes to the districts. Recommendations have been made to the Planning Board for consideration which in turn will present the revised ordinance to the voters for approval at the 1983 town meeting.

The Commission meets the third Tuesday of every month at the Town Offices. All meetings are open to the public and citizen participation and input is encouraged.

Exeter Board of Adjustment

During 1982, the Board of Adjustment scheduled 17 meetings to hear 24 variance appeals and 24 applications for special exceptions. Conversions, that is the adding of apartments to existing older homes in town, were again prevalent this year,

and resulted in an increase of 10 housing units. A special exception, as allowed under the Growth Management Ordinance, was granted for a proposed 24-unit building at the Exeter West Complex, also a proposal for five residential condominium units in the downtown was granted by special exception. In all, 19 special exceptions were allowed and 18 variance requests granted.

The Board of Adjustment consists of five members and five alternates appointed by the Selectmen. Under New Hampshire laws, the Board of Adjustment is empowered to grant variances when peculiar circumstances exist which create a hardship upon the applicant in conforming with the strict requirements of the zoning ordinance; the Board also hears applications for special exceptions which is a discretionary approval for a use allowed by the ordinance, subject to special criteria.

Any citizen who might wish to serve on the board should contact the town selectmen.

Board of Adjustment hearings are scheduled on the first Tuesday of each month, with additional meetings as necessary. Applications for appeals are due in the Planning Office two weeks prior to a scheduled hearing in order to meet requirements of notice to abutters and posting in a local newspaper.

Council on Aging

The Exeter Council on Aging was formed in 1973 with a twelve member board. Of that original board, the following people are still members: Douglas Dicey, chairman, Flavia Page, secretary, J. Harold Carbonneau, Robert Shaw, Lawrence Dougherty, all with ten years of volunteer service to the community. A member of the original board, Alice Barrett, is no longer active, but is still involved as blood pressure chairperson. Alice reports that the first blood pressure clinic began on November 4, 1974 at the Community Center, and later moved to St. Michael's Church for the needed extra space. A blood pressure clinic is also held now at the Squamscott Apartment Senior Housing. Other activities sponsored by the Exeter Council on Aging over the past ten years include a senior citizens' forum, meals program, foot care clinic, cookouts, discounts with the local merchants, and the most popular program, the discount taxi program. During the past ten years, more than 63,000 rides were provided for Exeter senior citizens age 62 and over. This could not have been done without the help and continued support of the Exeter Town Managers, Boards of Selectmen, and you, the general

public.

In January of 1983, the council hopes to have printed a monthly newsletter, printed at no cost to the council other than the preparation of the monthly information and the sending to the printer. The cost will be paid by merchants in the Exeter area. The council feels that this newsletter will help many of its seniors understand the purpose of the council, and perhaps provide the seniors of an opportunity of having articles printed in the newsletter.

Beginning in February, the Recreation and Parks Department will honor a senior citizen each month. The senior will be honored for his or her outstanding work in the community, and an article will be written each month about the recipient and published in the newsletter.

The Exeter Council on Aging would like to extend a thank you to the merchants and townspeople for their continued support.

Welfare

It appears that the taxpayers of Exeter are reaping the benefits of their wise investment in a prevention of delinquency program. Juvenile costs and placements are among the

lowest per capita in the state.

The Exeter Mediation Program, a process to help resolve parent-child disputes, received both state and national recognition this year. As a Model Program for the State of New Hampshire, the Exeter Mediation Program was reviewed by the Office Of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and received a national award in August of 1982. We seem to be on the right course in our plan to prevent costly juvenile placements.

The Direct Relief portion of the Welfare budget is to assist persons whose income is not sufficient to maintain a decent standard of living. The number of applicants for assistance decreased in 1982. The amount budgeted for this category was sufficient.

Aid to Persons with Total Disability and Intermediate Nursing Care costs were within budget, with Old Age Assistance running a bit over projected costs.

Despite severe economic times nationally, the Welfare budget seems to be well within bounds.

Citizens Advisory Committee

The Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) is a volunteer group of citizens who serve as an advisory body to the Board of Selectmen and the Exeter Office of Community Development on matters relating to the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

The Community Development Office, through 1982, has completed administration of a 1980 grant to the town in the amount of \$364,000. Under this program, 24 residential units of housing have been rehabilitated by way of grants made to homeowners. Also, in December, 1982, properties acquired on Portsmouth Avenue and Auburn Street have been transferred to the Exeter Housing Authority who will seek rehabilitation funds from the Department of HUD for the eventual

occupancy by seven low/moderate income families of Exeter.

A 1982 grant proposal was unsuccessful in receiving HUD funding; however, a new application phase will begin in the spring of 1983, with the Citizens Advisory Committee again seeking recommendations for eligible projects to benefit Exeter citizens. The CAC is exploring possibilities of applying for funds which would provide incentives for the continued renovation of downtown properties and promoting development compatible with the Downtown Master Plan. Citizen input to members of the CAC or directed to the Planning Office is always welcome.

Mosquito Control Commission

In 1982, the four-town cooperative mosquito control district made up of Exeter, Hampton Falls, Newfields, and Stratham, became the first district in the east coast to use an all-terrain vehicle (ATV) to simplify spraying in the swamps and help hold down the cost of the programs. The eight-wheeled machine, which can travel in mud, water, or on solid ground, was purchased by the Town of Stratham, and was used in 1982 to help disperse a biological control agent on the districts' extensive salt

marsh acreage which produces mosquitoes so abundantly. The ATV, which is rented out by Stratham to the other towns in the district, will have completely paid for itself by the end of 1983 season due to the labor it saves and is expected to go on saving the town's money for many years to come. The biological control agent (a bacteria) is preferred over chemical insecticides because its effects are specific to mosquito larvae.

Surveying and larviciding (killing mosquitoes as larvae) around neighborhoods and recreational areas from March through August also helps reduce mosquito annoyance which is caused by fresh water species with a limited flight range. We were able to locate and treat many additional sites throughout the district in 1982 because we were able to redistribute some of the labor funds saved by the new machine. Keeping up with these treatments was a challenge last summer because of the unusually heavy rainfall which we received. Extensive rains can cause additional flooding on the salt marsh as well as freshwater sites and increase mosquito production.

Mosquito annoyance in late July and August can be caused by rainfilled tires, pails, treeholes and birdbaths in your own backyard. These objects act as an ideal breeding habitat for a species of mosquito noted for its painful bite which may utilize these containers to produce up to seven thousand (7,000) larvae per square foot of surface water. This problem can be solved easily by occasionally changing the water in birdbaths during this period, or by removing, filling, or overturning tires, treeholes and pails. We need everybody's cooperation to help combat mosquitoes and we are sure your neighbors will appreciate your efforts. If you are unable to remove

old tires from around your home, give us a call at 778-0591, ext. 139, and we may be able to assist you.

Adulticiding, or fogging down the streets of town, is a back-up control method used in three of the four towns for those times when larviciding is just not effective enough. We use this method when our monitoring indicates that adult mosquitoes are at high levels. Adulticiding usually begins in late May and lasts through mid-July, after which it is only used when heavy summer rains or saltmarsh flooding cause adult populations to increase again. In 1982, spraying continued into September in an attempt to minimize the effects of a possible Equine Encephalitis outbreak. There was a total of nine cases in the area last summer, all involving horses and all nine animals died. There were no cases reported within the four-town district.


I would again like to emphasize, as I have in the past, that the object of mosquito control is not to eradicate mosquitoes, which is impossible, but rather to lower the overall number of mosquitoes for as many people as possible. To do this, we utilize a variety of scientific methods to continually improve upon the effectiveness of the program while maintaining the lowest possible cost and moving toward the most environmentally sound methods of combating mosquitoes.
